




Mount Beppo Art Group

Earlier songs are being consolidated, with harmonies added or stylistic changes made, to improve the overall performance of the song. At a recent session, we learnt the 12 bar blues, and played and sang some songs based on the 12 bar blues. One happy Muso commented that it's "fun and serious wrapped into one!" The friendly group enjoys sharing their musical ideas and knowledges during the session, as well as over a cuppa during the morning tea break. (The home baking is awesome too!)

How I Frame Photographic Prints Part 2

Last month I discussed how I made frames with unpainted timber. One thing I didn't add to this was making a frame with *painted* timber. As mentioned last time I use commercial moulding mostly, including painted moulding, usually either black or white. The same issues are present with these as well - bending, twisting and so on, but there is an additional issue here - a thing called tare-out. This happens when doing the 45 degree corner cuts with a saw, leaving small gaps or irregularity in the paint edges resulting from the cutting process. This is a real pain as they have to be fixed or the frame corners will look bad. There are two (2) ways to fix this. The first is to eliminate the problem by using a purpose built frame cutter which uses a set of 45 degree guillotine blades to slice the timber. These machines cost around \$5000+ (which I don't have) so I use the second method! Once the frame has been glued and nailed, the corners are sanded smooth then a wood filler is applied to smooth out the gaps resulting from the missing bits of paint. I use Timbermate (available in a range of colours) from Bunnings. Of course, once the painted moulding is sanded, this will require a complete sanding and repainting of the entire frame to restore the original finish. There are other products that can be used but I have found this method, although more involved, usually better.



The image on the left shows the missing bits of paint resulting from the cutting process necessitating gap filler, sanding and repainting.

If not checked, this problem can arise where the rebate thickness is different on different frame pieces. These pieces came from the same moulding pack and I only realised what had happened after I finished making the frame!





Now, back to the finishing steps.

With plain timber I usually finish the frame with a cabinet makers wax, applying at least 3 coats. This adds depth and a smoothness that other products I have used cannot match and if you want to get fancy, there are additional finishing waxes that are scented. Waxing also makes the timber very easy to clean.

If the frame is painted, I spray paint it, usually applying 2-3 coats then use a finishing hardener to help prevent marking.

Once completed, the D-Ring sites are marked and pre-drilled to suit the size of the screw needed for the weight of the final frame. D-rings are generally located about 1/3 the way down from the top. I then place the finished frame on an old towel to prevent scratching (whether waxed or painted) and start putting everything together. Glass is cleaned both sides using an ammonia free

cleaner and microfibre cloth before placing in the frame. The matted image is laid on top of that, making sure the orientation of the image matches the placement of the D-rings. At this point I usually hold everything together and flip the frame over so I can see if there are any dust spots, mat debris or anything else that may be trapped between the matted image and the glass. If so,



the frame is placed face down again, the matted image removed carefully and the offending bit removed. This process is repeated until I'm happy there are no distracting pieces left.









You can chose to seal or not seal the back.



The next step is to fix the mat in place. I used a Logan Point Driver which "shoots" points into the timber, holding the back of the foamcore in place. Note that there are two types of points - flexible and rigid. Flexible points have a black coating which I have found comes off quite easily and frustratingly tends to end up residing between the glass and mat necessitating further removal and cleaning. Rigid points are galvanised steel and do not have any coating. I use these exclusively now. The number of points to use depends on how big the frame is. For large frames I place 2 near each corner and then about 10cm apart on all four sides. Smaller frames are done as per the photos.

The next step, if required, is to use framers tape to seal the back of the frame. I use a brand called Kikusui which is specifically designed for this purpose. Once done the D-rings are then screwed in using a hand screwdriver. I do not use a power drill with a screwdriver attachment because it is easy to over tighten and possibly risk damaging the frame. Hanging wire is then attached to the d-rings. I use plastic coated stainless steel wire which is tied on slightly loose.

And that's it. I hope you enjoyed reading this. If there are any requests for articles, let me know.
